

We are one

This is a wonderful time of the year. The days are getting longer. The long winter has passed and the flowers are starting to bloom. There is more light around and that does the soul good. It truly does one good to see life in full bloom. But Holy Week and Easter is not just another week, another set of public holidays. It is the most important week for the Christian. At Easter, we celebrate the fact that God, the creator of the Universe, the source of all that is, loved us so much that he became one of us and lived among us. So great was his love, that he allowed himself to be unjustly condemned and crucified in order to rise from the dead. God did this for no other reason other than that it was an act of pure love for each one of us. No agenda. No hidden motives. Just profound love for you and me. This is what we celebrate. We celebrate God's victory over death, for in Jesus we have learned that there is no death. We are born to live forever and no one and nothing can take that away from us.

I was very struck by the interview with Archbishop Diarmuid Martin at a conference in aid of the organisation "Aware". He was asked what his faith meant to him and his reply was simple but profound. The Archbishop said his faith encapsulated three things: the dignity of every person as God created them; that God created us as a family and we must give expression to that in the way we live; and that God gave us a home on earth which we must care for. When you think about it, if our faith encouraged us to have such a belief, what a world we could have. It would be a world where there is respect for all life, where we are brothers and sisters who look after one another, and a planet that we recognise that we share and have responsibilities to look after it. That is revolutionary. It is also what the Easter message is all about. We are one and in "God we live and move and have our very being". The words "Thy Kingdom Come" have a lot of consequences so be careful how you pray it. Happy Easter!

Jean is passionate about the need to provide opportunities for social interaction and fun, an antidote to loneliness and isolation, especially after retirement or bereavement. ARI collaborates with Age and Opportunity and Third Age to promote active ageing in the community working on issues relating to the needs and rights of older people.

A priest that I know was telling how he has a lovely Parish Pastoral Centre. But he commented that it was proving very expensive and challenging to keep it going. One of his parishioners told him that she had more or less resigned herself to the fact that the Church in their parish would close at some point. This did not trouble her but she said that she would be very upset if the Parish Pastoral Centre closed as it was useful to the community. The priest asked her to elaborate on why she was so pessimistic. She said that her own grown up children did not go to Church or support it by financial contributions. She had also noticed that her family was no different from other families. In a sense her children had already made a decision about the future.

This conversation is probably one that could be said about a lot of parishes. It is not Archbishop's House or the priest who will close a church, it will probably be the Health and Safety Authority. What the future holds is very much dependent on the support that Parishioners give by their active involvement and by their financial contributions. Choice has consequences. What we give to the Planned Giving Fund and the Church Collections reveals our decision about the future.

Enthusiastic and faithful, attending every Sunday mass, Jasmine Banye, Chloé Falkner and Isabella Byrne have been assisting our community as altar servers for over two years.

Sometimes we can overlook the contribution our youth make in our local community, so we made an appointment to meet up with these young girls and talk about their experience.

So how did the girls get involved? Well Isabella's Dad asked her to try it out and two years later she's still

on board. Jasmine's Mum mentioned the idea to her and as she had already been impressed by the altar servers she had seen at mass, she decided to give it a go, while Chloé talked about Fr. Tom visiting their class. She had never seen an 'alb' before (the white garment they wear) and she really liked what Fr. Tom told them. Her Dad had been an altar server as a young boy, so she was happy to continue the family tradition!

The girls spoke about the different people they meet each week and the fact that the occasion brings

all their family together, including grandpas and grandmas, aunts and uncles. They all said they feel "closer to the community of the Parish" and they talked about how much they've learnt about the mass, for example, what a chalice is and why the bells are rung. In particular, they mentioned they understood the prayers better... "they meant more now." Initially the girls thought they'd be nervous out in front of so many people, but they said the training provided by Deacon Jeremy Seligman, along with Siobhán Seligman, Cathy Sands and Fr. Tom, helped keep everything simple and meaningful. "Even if we forget something, the priests are very kind and give us a reminder!"

They credit their parents for being very supportive, as they help get the girls to the church on time and are sometimes even known to give a little signal from the pew if they notice something they need to do! They all love "ringing the bells" and find the mass easier to follow. Their friends are supportive and often interested, so they would definitely encourage more boys and girls to volunteer, especially those who are making their Communion and Confirmation shortly.

We want to say a big THANK YOU to all involved, past and present, in supporting this very important service to our community.

I was looking back at some previous issues of the "Contact" magazine and noted that the topic of "Cherrywood" has appeared more than once. Indeed I saw that it was even an item on an agenda of the 'Pastoral Development Renewal' group in the parish in the late 1990's and again in the early 2000's. But now it does appear to be actually happening. The diggers have begun their work and the roads and the Parks are about to be built.

Recently "Cherrywood Developments" had an Open Day. When one sees the plans for the new town, it is overwhelming in terms of scale. It is also a very impressive development in the way that it is being planned. There is no doubt that its development will have huge consequences for all of South Dublin and particularly for our own pastoral area of Cabinteely, Foxrock and Johnstown-Killiney.

When the development is complete it will have about 7,500 homes with a population of 30,000.

It is very much our hope and the wish of the Archbishop that we will have a presence in the new town of Cherrywood by way of a small Catholic Church. But the plans are at an early stage.

All of the area of Cherrywood is currently within the boundaries of Cabinteely Parish. But clearly the pastoral care of Cherrywood Catholic Community will be under the care of the pastoral area team of Cabinteely, Foxrock and Johnstown-Killiney. As we move forward that pastoral area could also include other parishes as we try to address the issue of rapidly declining numbers of priests.

We will keep you posted.
