What Really Matters - our stories and memories

On Monday November 30th, St. Brigid's Parish Pastoral Centre hosted a workshop on the theme: 'What Really Matters? - Our Stories and Memories Matter'.

Our Parish Mission Statement includes the words 'Believing we are loved and accepted by God, our aim is to make this love visible, by working together to nurture a truly Christian community...as in a home, all know they are welcome and have a real sense of belonging.'

This has been the purpose and aim behind a series of Art workshops held in our Pastoral Centre, where different generations in our community get to know each other and have fun collaborating on making something creative together. The finished works are displayed in the local Community Centres, the Church and in our local schools.

We approached a group of adults representing our local Parishes and also the wider community of Dun Laoghaire Rathdown and asked each participant to bring an object that would help share a story or memory of something 'that matters' to them.

The programme included simple team building moments, a 'journalist style' Q & A session and lots of animated conversation! We took photographs, relaxed over a delicious Afternoon Tea provided by some very generous local volunteers and collaborated in an Art installation to support the theme. The fruits of these few hours together were a wonderful collection of stories

and memories. The afternoon's activities were enthusiastically supported by Transition Year Students from Loreto College Foxrock.

We aim to have an exhibition in Spring of 2016, curated from the completed artwork, photos and written accounts which highlight the worth of how our seemingly 'ordinary' of experiences become 'extraordinary,' when shared.

We were reminded of the value of finding ways in our busy lives to spend time connecting with others. When asked at the end of the afternoon 'what really matters', there were many responses..."friendship, empathy, integrity, authenticity, hope"... But we felt one participant summed up our time together when they answered, "listening matters."

If you are of an age to remember that turbulent decade of the 1960's then you'll have to remember Bob Dylan's classic signature song "Times they are achangin". The lyrics read as relevant today as ever they did. How right he was - despite that prospect which caused our parents so many sleepless nights! Times are still a-changin'; I guess they always are. This is the case still in our world, in our country, in our society, our parish and in many of our family and friendship ties as well. The one change that impacts most with me is the obvious difference that last September's surprise sprung on me. Glad and grateful to be thus far on the road to recovery, I'm left under no illusion that what used to be 'par for the course' for me, is now to be seen only in my rearview mirror on my journey, once I've been given clearance to return.

The very generous support given by so many priests these past few months in keeping the weekly schedule of Masses as it always was, cannot be extended into the New Year – even when I return. To try to do so is foolishness in the extreme that would inevitably take its toll on far too many others. If you pause for a moment to think about the following: In our cluster area of Foxrock, Johnstown and ourselves, Mass is celebrated 46 times every week. This figure includes the two weekday celebrations in the Oratory in Cornelscourt. Each weekend, Mass in the cluster parishes is celebrated 14 times! Each of those church buildings is, give or take, no more than a mile apart from the next one. There are two ways to try to rationalise the present situation 1) is it that we have too many churches? or 2) is it the we have too few priests? Take your pick! Because neither option is sustainable for the future. Some reasonable rationalisation is going to have to be arrived at with the advice and suggestions of the Diocese, Clergy, Parish council members and other supportive parishioners.

My own recent history reminds me of another preteen chant in the early '60s that told the story of "Ten green bottles sitting on a wall" and if one green bottle should accidently fall then...etc etc!! AO'N


Money matters

The last few years have been difficult financially for everyone. Thankfully, our income, your donations, has remained fairly constant, falling slightly each year, but we have controlled our costs very effectively.

A reduction of over $\[\epsilon 70,000 \]$ per year has resulted in the parish being in a position to meet its outgoings. And with the Parish Centre generating enough income to pay for itself, including the repayments due to the

bank, we are, at last, on a sound financial footing. We can now focus on the provision of the pastoral and community services, which we would all love to provide.

Any observant person will have noticed the improvements made in the Village and estates since the Team's formation eight years ago. However the prize money, DLRCoCo funding and donations from Cabinteely & District Resident Association and some estates, keep the Team funded without having to seek donations from residents, to date.
